Introduction

This is the fourth quarterly and year-end report for the year 2010-2011 for juveniles that have been assessed throughout the components of the Juvenile Assessment Center, including Civil Citation and Juvenile Drug Court.

This quarter the booking/intake unit of the JAC booked and screened four hundred and thirty-one (431) juveniles. This is an increase from the previous quarter in which four hundred and twenty-two (422) were screened. Civil Citation had a decrease from seventy-two (72) citations issued in the last quarter to sixty-eight (68) during this quarter. This year the booking/intake unit of the JAC booked and screened one thousand six hundred and sixty-nine (1,669). This is a decrease from the previous fiscal year in which one thousand seven hundred and forty-two (1,742) were screened. Civil Citation has had a decrease as well in the program participants from three hundred and fifty-two (352) last year to two hundred and sixty-eight (268) during this fiscal year.

The Drug Court program continues to serve youth in Leon, Gadsden and Wakulla Counties.

Booking/Assessment

Four hundred and thirty-one (431) intake screenings have been completed through the Booking/Assessment unit this quarter. This is an increase from the last quarter when four hundred and twenty-two (422) youth were booked and screened.

Follow ups were completed on JAC clients that were referred to the JAC in April, May, and June 2010. The data reflected that seventeen percent (17%) of clients referred from April 2010 recidivated; twenty-six percent (26%) from May 2010 recidivated; and twenty-three percent (23%) from June 2010 recidivated as of when data was finalized on July 1, 2011. This data shows a twenty-two percent (22%) recidivism rate for juveniles that came through the JAC a year ago during the same reporting quarter. (Please refer to Table 1).

The majority of youth served during this quarter have been for males at three hundred and twenty-nine (329) or seventy-six percent (76%). Seventy percent (70%) of offenders this quarter were African-American and twenty-six percent (26%) Caucasian. The most frequent age cohort was 12 - 15 year olds at fifty percent (50%) for the quarter and 16-18 year olds at forty-nine percent (49%) for the quarter. (Please refer to Table 2).

The majority of youth arrested this quarter, at sixty percent (60%), have been for misdemeanors. Thirty-six percent (36%) of juveniles brought to the Booking/Intake unit this quarter were arrested on felony charges and twenty-eight percent (28%) were arrested for Pick Up Orders, Warrants, and Violations. Year-to-date statistics show that fifty-nine percent (59%) of all arrests have been for misdemeanors, thirty-seven percent (37%) for felonies and thirty-four percent (34%) Pick Up Orders and Violations. This represents a decrease of six percent (6%) for misdemeanor arrests, a one percent (1%) increase in felonies and a two percent (2%) decrease in Pick Up Order and Violations from last year’s annual report. (Please note that a youth can be brought in to the JAC on multiple offenses.)

The majority of youth this quarter were transported to the Juvenile Detention Center at sixty percent (60%) while nineteen percent (19%) were released to their parents/guardians. (Please refer to Table 3).

During the quarter, fifty-eight (58) urinalysis screens were conducted. Of that amount, forty-one percent (41%) were negative and eighty-two percent (82%) were positive for Cannabis. The urinalysis screens at the JAC are voluntary and the majority of the youth coming through the JAC are familiar with the system and refuse to be screened. (Client may test positive for more than one substance). (Please refer to Table 5).

Booking & Assessment Highlights

- ♦ Juveniles charged with a crime of petit theft accounted for a total of twenty-three percent (23%) of misdemeanor arrests during this quarter, with total misdemeanors at sixty percent (60%) and felonies at thirty-six percent (36%).
- ♦ Twenty-four (24) weapons were confiscated from juveniles by law enforcement this quarter prior to being brought to the JAC. Weapons confiscated included: fourteen (14) guns, three (3) knives, and seven (7) miscellaneous weapons.
- ♦ Arrests where drugs were involved (possession, paraphernalia, intent to sell, etc.) accounted for ten percent (10%) of all arrests this quarter; misdemeanors at seven percent (7%) and felonies at two percent (2%).
- ♦ During the fourth quarter the Multidisciplinary Staffing team recommended that seventy-one (71) youth be referred to the Juvenile Outpatient Office (JOP). Leon JOP received eighty (80) referrals during the quarter and the program assessed thirty-seven (37) youth during the quarter. They recommended that sixty-five (65) be referred to the Juvenile Drug Court program and sixteen (16) youth were disposed for the program. The number of youth referred for services will depend on the number of youth that are disposed within the quarter.
- ♦ Data regarding out of county law enforcement contacts are now being tracked as well as youth that are screened at the JAC requiring a Gang Member Validation Form. During the fourth quarter there were eighty-two (82) calls to the JAC from law enforcement agencies outside of Leon County. Also, during the fourth quarter there was one (1) youth that required a gang validation form to be completed.

Civil Citation

Sixty-eight (68) citations have been issued during the fourth quarter. This is a decrease in four (4) referrals from the last quarter's report. The Tallahassee Police Department issued twenty-five percent (25%), the Leon County Sheriff's Department issued seventy-one percent (71%), FSU Police Department issued four percent (4%) and the Game and Fish Commission issued zero percent (0%).

The majority of youth issued civil citations this quarter have been for males at sixty-eight percent (68%). Referrals by race showed Caucasians at forty-nine percent (49%) and African-Americans at fifty percent (50%). The most prevalent age group was youth between twelve to fifteen (12-15) years old at sixty percent (60%) (Please refer to Table 6).

There were nineteen (19) referrals to the Y.E.S. Shoplifting program this quarter. Other data for the Civil Citation program showed that of the one hundred and forty-one (141) urinalyses tests completed this quarter, ninety-one percent (91%) were positive for Cannabis.

DISC Village, Inc. has partnered with the Wakulla County Civil Citation program and is providing services to their clients through the Teen Intervene program. At this time the Teen Intervene data was not available.

Civil Citation Highlights

- ◆ Ninety-four percent (94%) of citations have been closed successfully this quarter. Five percent (5%) have been closed unsuccessful, one percent (1%) was ineligible for the program and zero percent (0%) were withdrawn by the referral source.
- ◆ Community referrals accounted for fifty-one percent (51%) of the referrals this quarter and school referrals accounted for forty-nine percent (49%).
- ◆ Civil citation clients completed two thousand five hundred and eleven (2,511) community service hours this quarter. The number of community service performed is determined by the amount of hours being assigned by law enforcement officers issuing citations.
- ◆ Quarterly awards are given to the officers/deputies that issue the most citations during the quarter. The officers/deputies receive a framed certificate, a gift certificate and their name engraved on a plaque. The awards this quarter go to Officers Mel Gaston and Kathleen Connell, with the Tallahassee Police Department and Deputy Alan Wilson, with the Leon County Sheriff's Office.

Juvenile Drug Court

One hundred and forty-five (1456) juveniles were served in Juvenile Drug Court during the quarter. Forty (40) juveniles were newly referred to the Juvenile Drug Court during the quarter. Of those forty (40) newly enrolled in the program, eighty percent (80%) were male and twenty percent (20%) were female. Thirty-eight percent (38%) of clients served were Caucasian, sixty percent (60%) were African/American, zero percent (0%) were Hispanic and two percent (2%) were other.

The most common age cohort of newly enrolled clients was 16-18 year olds at seventy percent (70%). The primary reason for referral was Other at fifty-three percent (53%) followed by Possession Cannabis Less Than 20 Grams at twenty-seven percent (27%). Note that youth can have more than one reason for referral. (Please refer to Table 8).

During the quarter, one thousand six hundred and seventy-one (1,671) urinalysis screenings were conducted. Of that amount, eighty percent (80%) were negative, thirteen percent (13%) were positive for Cannabis and four percent (4%) was positive for Amphetamines. (Client may test positive for more than one substance). (Please refer to Table 9).

Juvenile Drug Court Highlights

- ◆ There were thirty-three (33) closures this quarter, of which twenty-two (22) or sixty-seven percent (67%) were closed successful. Eleven (11) clients or thirty-three percent (33%) were closed unsuccessful and zero (0) clients or zero percent (0%) were transferred to another program.
- ◆ The fourth quarter of this fiscal year sees the program serving one more client at this time last year (117/145). The year-to-date totals are higher than last year (206/220). This is also the highest number of total clients served since the program started in August 1997.
- ◆ The program continues to work with each youth and their family individually to serve their needs. The participants and their families are provided a setting to work on the issues that brought them to this stage in their lives. The program offers an opportunity to help the participants regain the trust of their family, establish familial boundaries, build educational and vocational goals, make positive peer choices, engage in positive activities within their communities and help the participants see the effects that substance use has on their lives and those around them.
- ◆ The program participated in the 13th Statewide Graduation on the 13th of May as part of the National Drug Court Month. We honored seven (7) graduates from all three counties and had two honored guest speakers, Dr. Brenda Jarmon and Tony Parker. A reception for the honorees followed the ceremonies.
- ◆ The participants of the program also engaged in community projects this quarter. They made Mother's Day and Father's Day cards to take to the residents at the Miracle Hills Nursing Home in Tallahassee, Florida. They visited with the residents when they presented the cards that they had made. The program participants also had a Spring Food Drive for the Second Harvest Food Bank. The juvenile services client's collected over two hundred and forty-seven (247) pounds of non-perishable food items and learned the importance of helping others in their community.

Juvenile Assessment Center Case Study

Quarter 4, FY 2010-2011

On April 14, 2011 David Collins, a 13 year-old African American male was referred to the Juvenile Assessment Center (JAC) for Burglary of an Unoccupied Dwelling Unarmed and Larceny Grand Theft \$300 Less Than \$5,000. The youth has a history of delinquency in the State of Florida and is currently is committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice.

At the time of arrival at the JAC, the youth underwent a pre-screen conducted by the on-duty Correctional Officer. The youth did not present any physical injury, was not currently suicidal, was not intoxicated and was mentally able to be formally accepted into the JAC. The youth then was photographed, booked and fingerprinted. The on-duty JAC Technician located the youth in the Juvenile Justice Information Systems (JJIS) database.

The Screener photographed the youth and uploaded the image into JJIS. The Screener explained the DISC Village forms and had the youth sign the forms. The youth declined to submit to a urinalysis screen. The Screener then began the screening process. The youth failed to report that he was currently taking psychotropic medication, however the information was clarified when speaking with the youth's guardian. As a result of the youth's recent placement at the JAC, the youth did not warrant a Global Appraisal of Individual Needs (GAIN). Due to the youth's current offenses and prior delinquency history, the youth was securely detained.

The youth first entered the juvenile court system on January 15, 2010. He was initially referred to the JAC for Petit Theft and Criminal Mischief. At the time, the youth's case was referred to the multidisciplinary staffing team. The team presented updated information and discussed the appropriateness for a diversionary program. The team deemed the youth was appropriate to participate in the Intensive Delinquency Diversion Services (IDDS) program and forwarded the recommendation to the State Attorney.

The youth successfully completed the program on September 14, 2010. However, the youth was arrested again on November 29, 2010 for two non-violent felonies and was released. He was arrested on December 16, 2010 for two felonies and one misdemeanor and was securely detained. On January 14, 2011, the youth was committed minimum risk to AMI Kids of Tallahassee. He offended again on February 16, 2011. Due to the extensiveness of the youth's delinquency history, on May 11, 2011, he was committed moderate risk to the Twin Oaks Academy in Greenville, FL where he is currently receiving rehabilitation. At the completion of the residential program, the youth will be placed on conditional release under the Circuit Two Henry and Rilla White Foundation.

Civil Citation Case Study

Quarter 4, FY 2010-2011

On April 27, 2010 a seventeen-year-old Caucasian male completed an intake assessment with the Civil Citation Program. The Leon County Sheriff's Office referred the client to the program due to a Public Affray charge. During the intake process, the client learned the program rules and became familiar with the sanctions he would need to complete to be successful in the program. Midpoint into the intake process, the Case Manager completed a G.A.I.N Q assessment with the juvenile. The sanctions issued to the client by the law enforcement officer were 20 hours of community service. In addition, the Case Manager issued the following additional sanctions; apology letter, 1,500 word essay, and mandatory anger management classes since the offense involved a physical altercation with another teenager. The client has successfully completed the apology letter and 1,500 word essay within two weeks of starting the program. The client keeps the Case Manager updated weekly on the status of his sanctions and is on track to be finished with community service hours and anger management classes by May 26, 2011. Once the verification of the community service hours are received and the Case Manager receives notification from anger management instructor that client has completed all classes, case will be closed as successful.

Juvenile Drug Court Case Study

Quarter 4, FY 2010-2011

“Benjamin” was arrested on July 29, 2009 for Possession of Marijuana less than 20 grams. As a result, he was ordered to complete the Juvenile Drug Court Program as a part of his non-judicial agreement. “Benjamin” completed his intake assessment on 8/24/2009. “Benjamin” admitted to experimentation with tobacco, alcohol and marijuana. “Benjamin” first tried tobacco at the age of 14 or 15 and typically smokes Black-n-Mild cigars, however, admitted his use is “not very often.” “Benjamin” first tried alcohol at the age of 10. He admitted he tried a sip of liquor and did not like the taste. Finally, “Benjamin” admits he first tried marijuana at the age of 13 and typically smokes 1 blunt by himself when he does use, which he stated is “every once in a while.” In addition, he disclosed during his intake assessment that he sometimes used substances to help deal with stress and frustration. “Benjamin” revealed that he has previously sold drugs for several months prior to beginning the program. He also expressed he’s gotten into a physical altercation once under the influence of marijuana. There is no history of substance abuse within “Benjamin’s” family. “Benjamin” scored a “7” on the Adolescent Alcohol Involvement Scale (AAIS), which places him in the category of “Adolescent – Rarely use alcohol.” According to the Nelson Chart, “Benjamin” met criteria for Stage II, “Regular use.” On the Quality of Life Survey, “Benjamin” scored a “93” out of a total possible score of 100.

“Benjamin” lives at home with his parents and grandmother. His older brother, is currently serving a federal prison term. “Benjamin” was unaware of the exact sentence, but indicated he has been incarcerated for about 6 years. This is “Benjamin’s” second time receiving counseling services. He previously completed counseling through Tabernacle Church, following his first marijuana possession charge. “Benjamin” has no mental health issues and denies current suicidal/homicidal thoughts.

“Benjamin” is currently attending Godby High School and is in his freshman year. He was retained twice from the 5th and 9th grade, respectively. His future goals include succeeding in life, having a good job and making sure everyone (in his family) is taken care of.

Once an intake assessment was completed with “Benjamin” he then began working towards completing the program, participating in various treatment services including individual counseling, group counseling, Chemical Education courses as well as submitting urinalyses on an ongoing basis throughout the program. “Benjamin” began the program testing negative and non-dilute. Two weeks into his treatment, “Benjamin” began testing positive for marijuana. He was set back in the program due to this and also received court sanctions. “Benjamin” began complying with the rules and expectations of Juvenile Drug Court until he tested positive for ethanol in November of 2009. “Benjamin” was set back once again and began a trend of testing positive for both marijuana and alcohol as well as missing urinalysis altogether. In March of 2010, “Benjamin” was court ordered to residential treatment and completed his intake at DISC Adolescent in April of 2010. While in treatment, “Benjamin” worked on dealing with triggers to use, coping with negative peer influence and improving his relationship with his parents while in family counseling. “Benjamin” successfully completed DISC Adolescent in December of 2010 and returned to the Juvenile Drug Court program in Phase III. In January of 2011, “Benjamin” tested positive for marijuana and admitted to use. He received time in the Juvenile Detention Center and was set back to Phase II. It was decided in a treatment team meeting that “Benjamin” would be allowed to graduate on 5/13/2011 which was National Drug Court day. He tested positive for marijuana again before 5/13/2011 and instead of graduating, he was given 15 days in the Juvenile Detention Center. It was again decided that the Juvenile Drug Court treatment team would allow “Benjamin” to graduate on 6/16/2011 as long as he complied with urinalysis and counseling sessions.

“Benjamin” progressed towards his goals, including demonstrating the ability to remain substance-free, working towards a successful completion of his GED and finding

employment. At discharge, "Benjamin" was awaiting the results of his GED test and was still living with his parents.

"Benjamin" graduated from the Juvenile Drug Court Program successfully on 6/16/2011.
