Introduction

This is the fourth quarterly report for the year 2014-2015 for juveniles that have been assessed throughout the components of the Juvenile Assessment Center, including Civil Citation and Juvenile Drug Court.

This quarter the booking/intake unit of the JAC booked and screened three hundred and eight (308) juveniles. This is a decrease from the previous quarter in which three hundred and forty-five (345) were screened. Civil Citation had a decrease from fifty-eight (58) citations issued in the last quarter to fifty-one (51) during this quarter.

The Drug Court program continues to serve youth in Leon, Gadsden and Wakulla Counties. The Civil Citation program is serving all counties in Circuit Two.

Booking/Assessment

Three hundred and eight (308) intake screenings have been completed through the Booking/Assessment unit this quarter. The year-end numbers for the JAC booking/intake unit were one thousand three hundred and forty-seven (1,347). This is an increase from the last fiscal year in which one thousand two hundred and sixty-nine (1,269) youth were served at the JAC. The year-end number of referrals to the Juvenile Civil Citation program was two hundred and twenty-seven (227). This number is a slight increase from last fiscal year in which two hundred and twenty-six (226) youth were referred to the program.

Follow ups were completed on JAC clients that were referred to the JAC in April, May, and June 2014. The data reflected that twenty-four percent (24%) of clients referred from April 2014 recidivated; thirty percent (30%) from May 2014 recidivated; and eighteen percent (18%) from June 2014 recidivated as of when data was finalized on July 10, 2015. This data shows a twenty-four percent (24%) recidivism rate for juveniles that came through the JAC a year ago during the same reporting quarter. (Please refer to Table 1).

The majority of youth served during this quarter have been for males at two hundred and thirty-six (236) or seventy-seven percent (77%). Seventy-one percent (71%) of offenders this quarter were African-American and twenty-seven percent (27%) Caucasian. The most frequent age cohort was 12 - 15 year olds at fifty-one percent (51%) for the quarter and 16-18 year olds at forty-seven percent (47%) for the quarter. (Please refer to Table 2).

The majority of youth arrested this quarter, at forty-nine percent (49%), have been for misdemeanors. Fifty-one percent (51%) of juveniles brought to the Booking/Intake unit this quarter were arrested on felony charges and eighty-three percent (83%) were arrested for Pick Up Orders, Warrants, and Violations. (Please note that a youth can be brought in to the JAC on multiple offenses.)

The majority of youth this quarter were transported to the Juvenile Detention Center at sixty-two percent (62%) while twenty-one percent (21%) were released to their parents/guardians. (Please refer to Table 3).

During the quarter, one hundred and eighty (180) urinalysis screens were conducted. Of that amount, forty-four percent (44%) were negative and eighty-one percent (81%) were positive for Cannabis. The urinalysis screens at the JAC are voluntary and the majority of the youth coming through the JAC are familiar with the system and refuse to be screened. (Client may test positive for more than one substance). (Please refer to Table 5).

Booking & Assessment Highlights

- ◆ Juveniles charged with a crime of Petit Theft accounted for a total of ten percent (10%) of misdemeanor arrests during this quarter, with total misdemeanors at forty-nine percent (49%) and felonies at fifty-one percent (51%).
- ◆ Twenty-two (22) weapons were confiscated from juveniles by law enforcement this quarter prior to being brought to the JAC. Weapons confiscated included: twelve (12) guns, two (2) knives, and eight (8) miscellaneous weapons.
- ◆ Arrests where drugs were involved (possession, paraphernalia, intent to sell, etc.) accounted for eight percent (8%) of all arrests this quarter; misdemeanors at eight percent (8%) and felonies at one percent (1%).
- ◆ In the fourth quarter forty-seven (47) youth were disposed to diversion programs. The year-end number of cases disposed to diversion programs was two hundred and eighteen (218).
- ◆ Data regarding out of county law enforcement contacts are now being tracked as well as youth that are screened at the JAC requiring a Gang Member Validation Form. During the fourth quarter there were twenty-one (21) calls to the JAC from law enforcement agencies outside of Leon County. Also, during the fourth quarter there was one (1) youth that required a gang validation form to be completed.

Civil Citation

Fifty-one (51) citations have been issued the fourth quarter. This is a decrease of seven (7) referrals from the last quarter's report. The Tallahassee Police Department issued twenty-seven percent (27%), the Leon County Sheriff's Department issued sixty-three percent (63%), FSU Police Department issued ten percent (10%), the FAMU Police Department issued zero percent (0%), Game and Fish Commission issued zero percent (0%) and Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco issued zero percent (0%).

The majority of youth issued civil citations this quarter have been for males at seventy-five percent (75%). Referrals by race showed Caucasians at thirty-nine percent (39%) and African-Americans at fifty-one percent (51%). The most prevalent age group was youth between sixteen to eighteen (16-18) years old at fifty-three percent (53%) (Please refer to Table 6).

The majority of civil citations issued this quarter were for Possession of Cannabis/Paraphernalia at forty-five percent (45%), followed by Petit Theft at thirty-one percent (31%). (Please refer to Table 7).

There were thirteen (13) referrals to the on-line shoplifting program this quarter. Youth needing substance abuse services are referred to our Juvenile Outpatient program in order to receive these services.

DISC Village, Inc. is the managing entity for the Civil Citation programs in Circuit Two. The numbers of referrals that have been received from the outlying counties are as follows: Wakulla (2), Gadsden (0), Jefferson (0), Liberty (0) and Franklin (2).

During this quarter the Leon County Civil Citation program entered into a partnership with the PAL program run by the Tallahassee Police Department. The Civil Citation program referred three (3) clients to the PAL program during the fourth quarter. The year-end number of youth referred to the PAL program was thirty-two (32).

Civil Citation Highlights

- ◆ Eighty-four percent (84%) of citations have been closed successfully this quarter. Twelve percent (12%) have been closed unsuccessful, two percent (2%) was ineligible for the program and two percent (2%) were withdrawn by the referral source.
- ◆ Community referrals accounted for forty-seven percent (47%) and school referrals accounted for fifty-three percent (53%) of the referrals this quarter.
- ◆ Civil Citation clients completed one thousand five hundred and sixty-eight (1,568) community service hours this quarter. The year-end number of community service hours completed by program participants was six thousand four hundred and sixty (6,460). The number of community service performed is determined by the amount of hours being assigned by law enforcement officers issuing citations.
- ◆ Quarterly awards are given to the officers/deputies that issue the most citations during the quarter. The officers/deputies receive a framed certificate, a gift certificate and their name engraved on a plaque. The awards this quarter go to Officers Josh Carswell, Tallahassee Police Department and Deputy Michael Punausua, Leon County Sheriff's Office.

Juvenile Drug Court

Seventy (70) juveniles were served in Juvenile Drug Court during the fourth quarter. Eighteen (18) juveniles were newly referred to the Juvenile Drug Court during the quarter. Of those eighteen (18) newly enrolled in the program, seventy-eight percent (78%) were male and twenty-two-percent (22%) were female. Sixty-seven percent (67%) of clients served were Caucasian, thirty-three (33%) were African/American, zero percent (0%) were Hispanic and zero percent (0%) were other. Juvenile Drug Court served sixty-five (65) new referrals throughout the fiscal year with forty-seven (47) new referrals in Leon County, thirteen (13) new referrals in Wakulla County, and ten (10) new referrals in Gadsden County.

The most common age cohort of newly enrolled clients was 16-18 year olds at sixty-one percent (61%). The primary reason for referral was Possession of Cannabis Less than 20 Grams at seventy-two (72%) followed by Other at twenty-two (22%). Note that youth can have more than one reason for referral. (Please refer to Table 8). The primary reason for referral throughout the year was Possession of Cannabis Less than 20 Grams at forty-five percent (45%), with the secondary reason being Other at thirty-six percent (36%).

During the quarter, five hundred sixty-five (565) urinalysis screenings were conducted. Of that amount, seventy-five percent (75%) were negative, ninety-seven (97%) were positive for Cannabis, three percent (3%) was positive for Cocaine and three percent (3%) was positive for Amphetamines. (Client may test positive for more than one substance). (Please refer to Table 9).

Juvenile Drug Court Highlights

- ◆ There were ten (10) closures this quarter, of which three (3) or thirty percent (30%) were closed successful. Three (3) clients or thirty percent (30%) were closed unsuccessful and four clients or forty (40%) were transferred to another program. Throughout the year the Juvenile Drug Court Program had a total of eighty-one (81) closures, of which twenty (20) were successfully closed. The program had eight (8) unsuccessful closures and fifty-three (53) clients were transferred to other programs.
- ◆ The program continues to work with each youth and their family individually to serve their needs. The participants and their families are provided a setting to work on the issues that brought them to this stage in their lives. The program offers an opportunity to help the participants regain the trust of their family, establish familial boundaries, build educational and vocational goals, make positive peer choices, engage in positive activities within their communities and help the participants see the effects that substance use has on their lives and those around them.
- ◆ The program participants continue to engage in community projects that serve the community including donating canned goods to Second Harvest throughout the year and completing community service hours at local institutions.
- ◆ For the fiscal year of 2015-2016 the program will work toward the goal of collaborating with community partners to increase the population served in Wakulla and Gadsden counties.


Juvenile Assessment Center Case Study

FY 2014-2015, Quarter 4

Youth KJ was arrested by Tallahassee Police Department for LARC-PETIT THEFT 2ND DEGREE 1ST OFFENSE on 05/28/2015. The youth was charged and brought to the Juvenile Assessment Center (JAC), where she was processed and transported to the detention center. The charge the youth was arrested for did not meet detention criteria, but based on the fact that she came through the JAC on three (3) separate occasions in the past 60 days, she qualified for secure detention status according to F.S 985.25(1) (b).

JAC Screener Margorie Anderson processed the youth for the LARC-PETIT THEFT 2ND DEGREE 1ST OFFENSE (M2). The Screener explained all proper DJJ and DISC Village forms and oriented the youth through the process of being screened at the JAC. The youth refused to submit a Urinalysis test (UA), while at the JAC.


During the screening process, the Screener spoke with the youth's grandmother by telephone. The youth's grandmother reported that KJ is not suicidal, does not have any mental health problems, and is not on any medication. The grandmother was advised that the youth would have court the following day at the Leon County Courthouse. A GAIN Q assessment was conducted on the youth during the screening process. The youth scored in the "no /minimal range" on all areas except for the Behavior Problem Scale and the General Crime Scale, where she scored "moderate range". The JAC Technician conducted a diligent search of the youth to determine if the youth had any outstanding warrants or any issues that law enforcement and JAC staff were not aware of at the time of arrest. Also, the Florida Safe Families Network (FSFN) was completed on the youth. The FSFN report indicated one (1) dependency case reopened. The youth's disposition has not yet been determined. According to the youth's face sheet, she has additional charges for VEH THEFT-GRAND THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE, BATTERY-TOUCH OR STRIKE on intake. Per JPO the youth was released from JDC with a competency review set for 08/06/2015.



Civil Citation Case Study

FY 2014-2015, Quarter 4

On March 4, 2015 a thirteen year old white female completed an intake for the Civil Citation Program. The Wakulla County Sheriff's Office referred the client to the program due to Possession of Cannabis Less Than 20 Grams. The client was eligible for the program because she was under 18, committed a first time misdemeanor offense and resided in Circuit Two. The program Case Manager met with the youth and completed an assessment using the Global Appraisal of Individualized needs (G.A.I.N.-Q) screening tool. The sanctions issued to the juvenile by the officer were 32 hours of community service. The Case Manager issued the following additional sanctions for the client to complete in order to be closed from the program successfully: essay, letters of apology to both her parents and to the school, outpatient counseling, and urinalysis (UA) testing. The client along with the client's mother also received additional family counseling with the outpatient Counselor. In addition, every 30 days the client and the outpatient Counselor performed an Intervention Plan Review to check on her progress in treatment services as well as completing her sanctions. On June 12, 2015 the client completed all of her sanctions and was successfully closed from the Juvenile Civil Citation Program. The client has not re-offended since her closure from the Civil Citation program. The Case Manager and outpatient Counselor provided the parent with information on how to access services if needed in the future as well as letting them know that they can contact the Civil Citation Program staff if any further issues arise.



Juvenile Drug Court Case Study

FY 2014-2015, Quarter 4

“Cody” was arrested on 4/30/2013 for Possession of Marijuana (Less Than 20 Grams). As a result he was ordered to participate in and successfully complete the Juvenile Drug Court Program per non-judicial agreement. Cody was assessed for the Juvenile Drug Court program on 11/14/2014 and was shortly thereafter admitted to Detox. After completing detox “Cody” returned to the Juvenile Drug Court Program and began participating in services on 1/6/2015. During the time of his assessment, “Cody” he scored a “60” on the Quality of Life Survey. “Cody” scored a “36” on the Adolescent Alcohol Involvement Scale (AAIS), which places him in the category of “Adolescent Heavy User”. According to the Nelson Chart, “Cody” meets the criteria for Stage 4: Dependency.

“Cody” lived with his biological mother, step-father, and half-siblings. “Cody” reported he had taken his GED test and is awaiting his results. “Cody” denied any mental health issues but did state that his father has been diagnosed with Bipolar Disorder and his mother has issues with anxiety. “Cody” denied having any past or present suicidal and/or homicidal ideations or attempts. “Cody” denied any gang involvement or affiliation.

Once the intake assessment was completed with “Cody”, he then began working towards completing the program, participating in all drug court treatment services provided including individual counseling, group counseling, as well as submitting random urinalysis on an ongoing basis throughout the program.

“Cody” participated consistently in the program since returning from detox and received one disciplinary infraction for testing dilute on 4/4/15. “Cody” completed a written essay for this infraction and turned it into the judge. With the exception of the initial UA’s while in detox, all other UA’s were negative and non-dilute. “Cody” has demonstrated a positive, cooperative attitude with each of his assignments and program requirements. During sessions “Cody” opened up about his past struggles with substances and worked with his primary counselor developing a plan focusing on relapse prevention and staying busy as boredom was a trigger for

use. “Cody” was able to accomplish his goal of staying busy by gaining an apprenticeship as a cobbler and working on the farm his girlfriend’s family owns. “Cody” was a bit hyperactive but complied when redirected during his sessions. Overall, “Cody” showed a positive and cooperative attitude in both group and individual sessions. “Cody” stated that he was determined to complete the program successfully.

“Cody” eventually completed all components of the Juvenile Drug Court Program including attending and participating in all group and individual sessions and testing negative and non-dilute for all randomly scheduled urinalysis.

“Cody” completed most of his goals while in the Drug Court Program including remaining free from substances and completing all assignments including his final essay. “Cody” was able to stay busy with work on the farm after completing his GED and at the time of discharge was living with his girlfriend and her family.

Cody graduated from the Juvenile Drug Court Program on 5/7/15.
