(6 consecutive weeks)
 Family Counseling 1 session per phase

 Community Involvement:..... Total of 24 hrs

What Is The Juvenile Drug Court Program?

The Juvenile Drug Court Program is the most intensive outpatient option available to youth who are arrested and have been determined to have substance abuse issues and may also present with mental health issues. The parent/guardian and the youth have the option of consulting with the Public Defender's designated attorney to explore other legal options before accepting Juvenile Drug Court as part of their sentence. For those families offered and accepting the Juvenile Drug Court Program, the State Attorney's office will expedite handling in these cases. It is required that an agreement be signed by the youth and their parent/guardian if they agree to comply with the program rules and sanctions.

Accreditation & Licensure

All service components are fully licensed and accredited.

- Licensed by the State of Florida
- Accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF)

How Does The Program Work?

The Juvenile Drug Court Program is a four phase program requiring **intensive participation** in the following:

- ◆ Individual Counseling
- ◆ Group Counseling
- ◆ Family Counseling
- ◆ Chemical Education Classes
- ◆ Community Involvement
- ◆ Self Help Support
- ◆ Parent Support Group
- ◆ Observed Urinalyses

Program duration is a minimum of 20 weeks. Services are available in Leon, Gadsden and Wakulla Counties. Initial program admission fees may apply.

Who's Appropriate for Juvenile Drug Court?

Substance-involved juvenile offenders, thirteen (13) to eighteen (18) years old, who may present with mental health issues and have been arrested for:

- ◆ Drug or alcohol related misdemeanor/felony charges
- ◆ Other offenses where the underlying factor is substance use

WHO IS NOT APPROPRIATE:

- ◆ Juveniles in need of extensive detoxification
- ◆ Juveniles in need of residential treatment
- ◆ Juveniles in need of emergency medical care
- ◆ Juveniles with an extensive delinquency history
